

PREFACE

The first edition of subclass KZ, Law of Nations, was published in 1997 as an experimental draft edition. Together with its companion subclass, JZ, International relations, it replaced the former subclass JX, International law. A revised 1998 edition of KZ resolved various issues identified by the Library of Congress and other institutions during the first year of application of the schedule. KZ was again published in 2007, cumulating additions and changes since 1998. This 2011 edition includes additions and changes since 2007 and contains a new development for international criminal law in KZ7000-KZ7500. The focus of the development is on the International Criminal Court (ICC). The new numbers for the ICC (KZ7250-KZ7490) include all subjects and doctrines relating to the ICC, as well as its reports, digests, and pleadings.

Classification numbers or spans of numbers that appear in parentheses are formerly valid numbers that are now obsolete. Numbers or spans that appear in angle brackets are optional numbers that have never been used at the Library of Congress but are provided for other libraries that wish to use them. In most cases, a parenthesized or angle-bracketed number is accompanied by a "see" reference directing the user to the actual number that the Library of Congress currently uses, or a note explaining Library of Congress practice.

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Jolande Goldberg, law classification specialist, created this schedule. She and Libby Dechman, senior cataloging policy specialist, are responsible for coordinating the overall intellectual and editorial content of class K and its various subclasses. Kent Griffiths and Ethel Tillman, assistant editors, are responsible for creating new classification records, maintaining the master database, and creating index terms for the captions.
